Knead us together in one loaf.


Free us from jealousy and selfish ambition;

## THE READINGS

**Epistle** 

Philippians 2:1-13 (NRSVUE)

If, then, there is any comfort in Christ, any consolation from love, any partnership in the Spirit, any tender affection and sympathy, make my joy complete: be of the same mind, having the same love, being in full accord and of one mind. Do nothing from selfish ambition or empty conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests but to the interests of others. Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus,

who, though he existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be grasped, but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, assuming human likeness.

And being found in appearance as a human, he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death—even death on a cross.

Therefore God exalted him even more highly and gave him the name that is above every other name, so that at the name given to Jesus every knee should bend, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Therefore, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed me, not only in my presence but much more now in my absence, work on your own salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who is at work in you, enabling you both to will and to work for God's good pleasure.

The Holy Spirit has a word for each of us today.

With God's help we are listening.

When Jesus entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came to him as he was teaching and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" Jesus said to them, "I will also ask you one question; if you tell me the answer, then I will also tell you by what authority I do these things. Did the baptism of John come from heaven, or was it of human origin?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why, then, did you not believe him?' But if we say, 'Of human origin,' we are afraid of the crowd, for all regard John as a prophet." So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I am doing these things.

What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' He answered, 'I will not,' but later he changed his mind and went. The father went to the second and said the same, and he answered, 'I go, sir,' but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness, and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him, and even after you saw it you did not change your minds and believe him."



The center of this text recalls Christ's post-Resurrection meal at Emmaus (Luke 24:13–35), a reminder that the Risen Christ is in our midst when two or three gather in his name (Matthew 18:20) and share a foretaste of the Heavenly Feast (Matthew 26:29/Luke 22:18/Mark 14:25).

#### \* INVITATION TO THE SACRAMENT OF COMMUNION

On this day, especially,

when the barriers between people are struck down,

God invites us to join Christians everywhere at the holy banquet table.

This is not my table,

nor the Old Stone Church's table,

but the table of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ,

and all are welcome here.

## \* PRAYER

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God.

It is right to give our thanks and praise.

Author of all life, in whose image each of us is made,

You meet us on the mountains and go with us through the valleys.

In Jesus Christ, your love for all was made evident.

He offered his life on our behalf;

was crucified, died, and rose victorious even over death.

Therefore, we join our voices with the voices of all created things, And with the voices of Your old and faithful friends, Saints that have gone before us to praise You, Saying this prayer of thanksgiving and praise:

Holy, Holy, Holy God of love and majesty,
The whole universe speaks of Your glory,
O God most high.
Blessed is the One who comes in the name of our God!

On the night Jesus was betrayed, he gathered his friends from all walks of life, wishing to share his last meal with those he loved. He took a common loaf of bread and made it into the extra-ordinary Bread of Life. He broke it and shared it with them, saying, "Whenever you eat this, it will bless you. This bread represents my body which is broken for you. Take some and eat it."
Then he poured ordinary drink and blessed it. He said, "Drink this, all of you. It represents my blood offered for you. Remember that your sins are forgiven."
Let us remember together the mystery of our faith:

Christ has died. Christ has risen. Christ will come again.

#### THE BREAKING OF THE BREAD AND THE POURING OF THE CUP

Gathered with his friends, Jesus took bread, blessed and broke it and saying:

Barukh ata Adonai Eloheinu melekh ha'olam hamotzi lekhem min ha'aretz.

"Blessed are You, Lord our God, Ruler of the universe, who brings forth bread from the earth.

When we break the bread. Is it not a sharing of the body of Christ?"

And pouring the fruit of the vine into the cup, he blessed it saying:

Barukh ata Adonai Eloheinu melekh ha'olam borei p'ri hagafen.

"Blessed are You, Lord our God, Ruler of the universe, who creates the fruit of the vine.

When we give thanks over the cup. Is it not a sharing in the blood of Christ?"



# Fall Book Study via ZOOM with Pastor Stephen

<u>Becoming Human: The Holy Spirit and the Rhetoric of Race.</u> by Luke A. Powery.

Over the past decade we have had a heightened public discourse on race in America.

It has been a polarizing and political flash point. It is vital as people of faith, disciples of Jesus Christ that we understand the matter of race from a Biblical and theological perspective. At Pentecost the gift of the Holy Spirit was the foundational birthing of Christianity, of the church universal. We proclaim that in baptism we are marked as God's own and are to ever be guided by the Holy Spirit. So, we must ask ourselves what does the Holy Spirit have to say to us this day and age on the matter of race. What will it take to heal ourselves, our churches, our society, and nation?

Please join me in a five week 6:30pm Wednesday evening ZOOM book study. We will be discussing one chapter a week, approx. 25-30 pages weekly.

The book is very accessible and scripturally grounded.

"Many titles, images and roles exist for the Holy Spirit; Luke Powery lifts up another: the Spirit as humanizer. In this book, Powery suggests that the Spirit is the one who humanizes us in the face of one of the most destructively dehumanizing forces our society has known: racism. ...yet Powery's meditation demonstrates both its fittingness and urgency. This work resounds with sobering conviction and expectant hope." — Daniel Castelo, Duke University Divinity School.
